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What is Lichty Guitars?

Handcrafted and built-to-order by the nimble hands of North Carolina luthier Jay Lichty, Lichty Guitars combines the highest quality materials with premium exotic and domestic tonewoods for custom-crafted acoustic instruments that are aesthetically stunning and acoustically superb. Committed to craftsmanship, Lichty single-handedly builds out of small workshop in Tyon, North Carolina each of the approx 25 artisan instruments he produces a year – crafting heirloom works of art.

Who is the artisan behind the guitars and ukuleles?

Jay Lichty, a musician all his life, was a career homebuilder until the economic downturn hit the home construction industry and Lichty took a chance and pursued his true calling. Having worked with his hands for most of his career, he took his passion for music and knowledge of woods and other raw materials and started Lichty Guitars, with his wife and business partner Corrie Woods. Corrie is responsible for marketing, website development and photography.

What well-known musicians play Lichty Guitars?

What's unique about the process of producing Lichty Guitars and Ukuleles?

With each commissioned instrument, Jay Lichty blends his own style and expertise with the partron's aesthetics and playing preferences, crafting instruments that designed with, and for, each individual.

What instruments are available?

How long does the artisan process take?

Three to six months

Where can the instruments be purchased?

Given Lichty Guitars are crafted by hand in a one-man-shop, production is limited and the majority of sales are custom-orders. The small number that are created for public sale are made available for direct purchase through www.lichtyguitars.com and select dealers. Instruments are shipped overnight to ensure safety.

How much do the guitars and ukuleles cost?

Guitars range from \$2800 to over \$8000. Ukuleles start at \$1600.

What is Lichty Guitars' Giving Back Program?

Luthier and Musician Jay Lichty Bio

Jay Lichty has been a musician all his life and a homebuilder for the better part of his professional career. When the economic downturn impacted the home construction industry and work became scarce Jay decided to try his hand at building a ukulele in his new-found free time. One ukulele led to another. Within months of building that first instrument Jay had the good fortune of taking a guitar-building workshop with master luthier, Wayne Henderson.

There has been no looking back since that first guitar. Jay has taken the attention he gave to quality and to polished details in his high-end home construction business into his shop and into his craft. Working with premium domestic and exotic woods and the finest materials he crafts each guitar with the greatest care. Most are built to order and he includes each patron of a custom instrument in the design process.

Jay hammered shut his contracting business and strung up his luthier business in the fall of 2009. Within its first year of business Lichty Guitars experienced tremendous success. Custom orders poured in, world-touring professional musicians lined up to get their Lichty and Garden & Gun magazine named Lichty Guitars the overall winner of the prestigious Made in the South awards.

While Jay crafts guitars to-order, his wife and business partner Corrie Woods works on getting the word out. She manages all promotions including design and maintenance of the website, photographing all aspects of the business to media outreach.

Together Jay and Corrie make a powerful team and communicate their commitment to quality, professionalism and creativity through every facet of Lichty Guitars.

His design was inspired by Mike's tattoos.

ROUGHLY FIFTEEN MONTHS AGO, JAY LICHTY HAD A DREAM. No, really, he had a dream,

A professional home builder and woodworker from Tryon, North Carolina, who has also been a musician for thirty years, Lichty, now fifty-four, was asleep one night when the next phase of his life got delivered to him.

"I had this really vivid dream, where I was playing this smallbodied instrument," he says. "It was like a small guitar, a really, really small guitar, and when I woke up the next day the dream just hung with me. So I decided to look into small guitars, and I hit on

\$1,200-\$8,000 lichtyguitars.com ukuleles. I now love ukuleles."

Within days of his epiphany. Lichty had bought a ukulele and was learning to play it. He loved the experience. "But that first one I'd bought was a big version of ukulele," he says, slightly sheepishly. "And then I wanted a small one, too...so I got one. Then I realized I'd bought two ukuleles in about two weeks. So the next week, when I saw another one I wanted to buy, I thought: It's a recession, there's not a lot of work for house building right now-why not save money and use your woodworking skills? Why don't you try to make one?'

At this, Lichty has proved a natural. Before long, he was taking luthiers' workshops around the Southeast, learning to build guitars and other stringed instruments from some of the region's masters. When he attended a seminar with famed Virginia craftsman Wayne Henderson, it all clicked.

"I watched how Wayne worked," Lichty says. "How his hands shaped the wood, how he trusted his hands to know when to stop shaving a brace or something. I watched very closely, and I thought, it's all in trusting the hands."

Since studying with Henderson, Lichty has never looked back. In the last fifteen months, he's built twenty-five guitars and a handful of ukuleles, only a few of which still reside beneath his roof. "I guess you could say I've been busy," he says. "It's like I've found a new outlet for my life."

When you see a Lichty guitar, his commitment to craft is obvious. He often mixes different woods, including exotics such as rosewood and koa, each with a different shade and grain, on various parts of the instrument's body. With their sometimes muted, sometimes bold features, the guitars look like fine art.

So far, four professional musicians (including Doug Lancio, lead guitarist for John Hiatt) use Lichty guitars, and neither Lichty's production capacity-working out of his shop in Tryon-nor his desire to learn has slowed since he first had The Dream.

"It's funny," he says, "this feels like what I was supposed to do when I grew up. I still have a lot to learn, but that's how it is when you try to make something nice and make it by hand. Every instrument you make is its own thing; with each one you learn something. There's a lot more to making a good guitar than working with wood."

 As the overall winner of the 2010 Made in the South Awards, Lichty will travel to Charleston, South Carolina, for a business consultation with Leapfrog Public Relations and Stitch Graphic Design.

Local Luthier Brings Wood Back to Life

Jay Lichty has a way with woods. Not just any woods like pine or oak. We're talking exotic woods with barely pronounceable names like bubinga, cocobolo, and Pau Ferro.

Lichty is one of those people who revels in making lemonade when presented with lemons. After enjoying a 25-year career as a successful building contractor, he began looking toward other creative outlets when the housing market took a downturn.



As a lifelong musician, he reasoned that he could combine woodworking and music and develop a new full time livelihood for himself. He'd been playing banjo and mandolin as a member of The Lone Derangers, so the fit was a natural.

Lichty says he learned to be a Luthier in the same hands-on fashion that he learned to be a builder: by apprenticing with a seasoned master of the craft. He jumped at the chance to sign up when he learned Wayne Henderson, an acknowledged master, would be teaching a guitar-making class at Tryon Painters and Sculptors in the fall of 2009. Lichty signed up immediately. He took to that class like a double-jointed finger-picker, and the result was that he devoted nearly all his waking hours to becoming a "Luthier," a musical-sounding word itself, which mean a builder of stringed instruments.

Within nine months, he had created more than two dozen meticulously crafted guitars and more than a dozen ukuleles.

He speaks of the instruments, lovingly handcrafted in his studio, as if they are, in fact, his babies. "I just enjoy bringing the wood back to life," Lichty says. And there has been no shortage of adoptive parents.

Corrie Woods, his partner and published author in her own right, has used her marketing expertise to work tirelessly on getting the word out on their collector-quality instruments in print and social media. "I could not have done this without Corrie," Jay insists. "She is the one responsible for getting their high-end Lichty Guitars known in the world of musicians. Without her, I'd just be some dusty guy walking around in a wood shop filled with unsold guitars and ukuleles."

In a scenario that all entrepreneurs dream of, word of the quality of Lichty's instruments has spread nationally, earning him features on television, in magazines and, most recently, a spot in the Christmas Catalog of the prestigious Sotheby's of New York.



Most rewarding of all to the couple is that nationally known musicians have



ordered and been thrilled with the unique smell, feel and sound of the Lichtys. Those musicians in turn, have spread the word to other professionals. Well-known artists, including Tom Gossin of the award-winning group Gloriana, who raved: It's absolutely amazing, fantastic, and exquisite! It sounds awesome. For any serious guitar player, this is out of control cool!" Jody Porter of Fountains of Wayne, chose to play his Lichty Honduran Mahogany Acoustic on his latest solo album, and Doug Lancio (Nashville Producer and lead guitarist for John Hiatt and Patty Griffin) is playing a Lichty as well.

Lest you worry, all the recognition has not swelled this Tryon Luthier's head. He recently donated an African Bubinga guitar to be auctioned at the Lake Eden Arts Festival (LEAF), with all proceeds

going to LEAF's non-profit programs.

Perhaps the most valued compliment Lichty has received comes from the world-renowned Luthier and musician who taught him the art. "I am proud to say I taught Jay to build his first guitar," says Wayne Henderson. "His guitars show great craftsmanship.."

In case you missed it, Lichty Guitars celebrated their first year in business by



Guitar Dreams

While we get occasional visitors at the *G&G* offices, rarely do we get drop-ins who come bearing musical instruments. So when an up-and-coming luthier from Tryon, North Carolina, showed up with three of his handmade acoustic guitars and even one ukulele, we gathered around as if someone had arrived with a plate of fresh biscuits. The instruments looked like works of art, but the biggest surprise was how beautiful they sounded, even when played (poorly) by some less-than-musically-gifted editors.

The luthier's name is Jay Lichty, 53, a musician most of his life and a homebuilder by trade until the economy put the kibosh on his business. Inspired by a dream he had one night about a small guitar-shaped instrument, Lichty found himself compelled to buy a ukulele. Then another. "I fell in love with them, and that started the whole ball rolling," he says. "I thought I better start building them if I want to keep acquiring them." It wasn't long before he made the jump to building guitars, studying with legendary luthier Wayne Henderson of Virginia. And today, Lichty runs his own one-man shop, blending his love of music and knack for carpentry into a whole new vocation.

Most of Lichty's guitars are built to order, a process he equates to a kind of alchemy as he works with his clients to select the right wood and components based on their individual preferences. It can take a month or more to complete a guitar, but the results are well worth the wait. Already some pro musicians have taken notice—most recently Doug Lancio, lead guitarist for John Hiatt, who was so impressed after trying one out that he brought it back to use in his Nashville studio, a sign Lichty may just have dreamed up his true calling.
